2. Continue to **Report** any Suspicions of **Child Abuse or Neglect** to our **REPORT LINE AVAILABLE 24/7: 330-941-8888**.
3. To protect the public's health and slow the rate of transmission of COVID-19, **some services** we provide to families may be *postponed or modified*.
4. If you have a scheduled event or activity with Children Services: a Family Visitation, Case Review meeting, or other appointment: **Call your Case Worker** via our **General Information line: at 330-941-8888** to determine any changes.
5. **At this time, the Children Services building will be OPEN to the public.**
6. Anyone seeking entrance **will be subject to a COVID-19 Screening Procedure**. *Entrance may be denied dependent upon the results.*

Agency Prepares COVID-19 Shelter for Emergency Child Placements

PANDEMIC PLAN CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1

The Agency's now over 20-page "Pandemic Response Plan" provides detailed guidance with input from various local and state agencies including: the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services, Ohio Governor and the Director of the Ohio Department of Health, the Youngstown Health Department as well as communication with the Directors of Public Children Services Agencies.

There are many issues and concerns facing Ohio's 88 public children services agencies during COVID-19 but at this time this is top priority:

Child Placements: The Agency is anticipating and preparing that as infection rates increase there may be substitute caregivers who refuse to take in new foster placements to help prevent spread of COVID-19 in their homes. In addition, the Agency must prepare for foster caregivers who refuse to facilitate bio parent/child visitation based upon legitimate concerns that doing so could expose the child they're caring for and/or their own family.

Children Exposed to COVID: The Agency must also be prepared to provide care for children exposed to or infected with COVID-19 until a foster home can be found. The Agency has secured isolation emergency shelter facilities which are stocked with essential items necessary for potential overnight stays. The goal is to reduce the trauma of the removal as much as possible while keeping the community, staff and children safe.



COVID-19 PREPARATIONS

MAHONING COUNTY CHILDREN SERVICES must be prepared to provide care for children exposed to, or are infected with, COVID-19 until a foster home can be found. The Agency has secured isolation facilities stocked with essential items necessary for potential overnight stays. The goal is to reduce the trauma of the removal as much as possible while keeping the community, staff and children safe.

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Mahoning County Children Services Achieves National Re-Accreditation

Mahoning County Children Services has achieved national re-accreditation through the New York-based Council on Accreditation (COA). Based on their findings, COA's volunteer-based



Accreditation Commission voted that Mahoning County Children Services successfully met the criteria for accreditation.

Organizations pursue accreditation to demonstrate the implementation of best practice standards in the field of human services. COA evaluated all aspects of Mahoning County Children Services' programs, services, management, and administration.

COA accreditation is an objective, independent, and reliable validation of an agency's performance.

The COA accreditation process involves a detailed review and analysis of an organization's administration, management, and service delivery functions against international standards of best practice. The standards driving accreditation ensure that services are well-coordinated, culturally competent, evidence-based, outcomes-oriented, and provided by a skilled and supported workforce. COA accreditation demonstrates accountability in the management of resources, sets standardized best practice thresholds for service and administration, and increases organizational capacity and accountability by

creating a framework for ongoing quality improvement.

To achieve COA accreditation, Mahoning County Children Services first provided written evidence of compliance with the COA standards. Thereafter, a group of specially trained volunteer Peer Reviewers confirmed adherence to these standards during a series of on-site interviews with trustees, staff and clients.

An endorsement of COA and the value of its accreditation process is reflected in it being named by the US State Department as the sole national independent accrediting body under the Hague Convention on Intercountry Adoption to accredit intercountry adoption service providers. In addition, COA is the only national accreditor designated by the U.S. Department of Defense to develop accreditation standards and processes for human service programs provided to military personnel and their families.

Founded in 1977, COA is an independent, not-for-profit accreditor of the full continuum of community-based behavioral health care and social service organizations in the United States and Canada. Over 2,000 organizations successfully achieved COA accreditation. COA has a total of 47 service standards that are applicable to over 125 different types of programs. No Pinwheel Garden Display for Child Abuse Prevention Month

April 2020 marks the first time in 15 years Mahoning County Children Services and Akron Children's Hospital did not plant its Annual Pinwheel Garden Display due to COVID-19 pandemic and Ohio's Stay-at-Home Order.

Both organizations also sponsor and host the *Annual Pinwheels for Prevention Community Event Luncheon* was also cancelled. This event publicly commemorates Prevention Month. 2020 marks the Event's 15th Year Anniversary.

Each year, thousands of pinwheels are 'planted' to help raise awareness for National Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Month in April.

The Pinwheel Planting Event scheduled for April 1, was cancelled due to the State issued Stay-at-Home Order.

Our community needs to remain even more vigilant during this Pandemic.

Families are facing unprecedented isolation, fears and anxiety is running at an all-time high. Many of these stressors place children at GREATER risk for child abuse and neglect.

State-wide Social Media Campaign **Ohio Wear Blue** Day is Huge Cyber Success



This year's **#OhioWearsBlue** Day on April 8 was even more successful than in previous years. With many public children services associations, child advocate organizations and stakeholders working from home, there was an even more concerted effort to show support of child abuse prevention cyberally.

Ohio Wears Blue day is a state-wide awareness campaign that takes place on the second Wednesday of every April to raise awareness of National Child Abuse Prevention Month. Ohioans are encouraged to wear blue to show support for PREVENTING child abuse and neglect.

This year Ohioans were encouraged to wear blue and post photos to the Public Children's Association of Ohio's (PCSAO) Twitter hashtag: **#OhioWearsBlue** Day. PCSAO represents and advocates on behalf of many of Ohio's 88 public children services agencies. She selected Easter Baskets as her project—and she never looked back. This annual spring project, Linda will tell you, has become her ‘niche.’ She

works year-round securing donations and shopping for a variety of fun items in order to make baskets for children ages infant to 18 years of age.

Retired teachers comprise the membership of Delta Kappa Gamma. DKG members have also been annual Easter Basket donors for the last two years. Both Linda's and the DKG Easter Baskets are not the average run-of-the-mill Easter Baskets. In fact, they're masterpieces. Each one with a theme and carefully crafted and created with love.
